Besides doing sentry duty and military drills, the soldiers engaged the visitors who wanted to know about their uniforms and their purpose when the island was a fort. The Third Artillery Band was also there, sporting their brass insignia

supplied by FOCWA; the band leader's jacket was also paid for by our organization. The band played as the boats were docking on the island and serenaded those who wished to hear tunes of the period.



We were delighted that the grandsons of members Phil Blake and Chuck Gardali participated this year; in fact, they were doing cannon demonstrations with the public on their own for awhile!

New this year was a scenario enacted by Nikki Rottender, an actor who was recruited to play the Mayor of San Francisco of 1860. As Mayor Henry Techemacher, Nikki read a "Proclamation to the Citizens of San Francisco" as visitors were starting their walk up the hill from the dock. The proclamation read as follows:

Citizens of San Francisco,

Now that we are engaged in a Civil War, I want to reassure you that the city is well protected by Army troops at the Presidio, Fort Point, and here on Fort Alcatraz. As you can see by your visit here, the troops are in a state of readiness, and fully prepared to deal with invasion from the sea or rebellion from within. I urge you to be vigilant, and if you see or hear any remarks or actions that are against the Union cause, report these to the authorities.

I also urge you young men to rally to the cause by enlisting in the California volunteer regiment. Men are needed to staff the forts in the West to keep the peace between the settlers and the Indians, and to put down any rebellions from Confederate sympathizers. There are enlistment tables set up today, and officers can sign you up immediately.

Finally, let us show President Lincoln that San Francisco is fully committed to the Union cause by holding a rally in the central square of the business district. I propose to name this area forever after as Union Square. Let us with one voice say "The Union, Forever!" Thank you.



Now whether the mayor at that time ever visited the island or issued such a proclamation is moot; but this scenario was intended to give the visitors a feel for the tenseness of the time, the appeal for patriotism, and the Union sentiment of San Francisco's citizens (most of them, anyway). During the request for recruits, one young lad was pulled from the crowd by the Sergeant and put into the ranks, where he was given a musket and hat. This delighted the crowd - and also his parents!

A favorite exhibit of visitors was the medical display that was set up in the guard room of the sally port. People are always curious to see the rather sophisticated instruments used for operations in the 1860's, the herbal remedies used, and to hear how operations were performed in those days. They learned that most of the deaths in the Civil War were caused by disease, not by wounds.
